Student Support Services is one of the eight federal TRIO programs funded by the U.S. Department of Education.

These programs are designed specifically to assist limited income and first-generation college students, and/or students with disabilities. There are over 1200 TRIO prgrams throughout the country assisting college students just like you.

The ASUB-Heber Springs SSS program is100% federally funded at \$261,888 per year to serve 140 students. In addition to the federal guidelines stated above, students selected to participate in SSS must also have a need for academic support and motivation to complete a college degree. Once accepted, you are considered a part of our program until you graduate or transfer.

DOWNLOAD OFFICE 365 FOR FREE

Go to your email, then click the App Launcher in the op left corner. Select "video" and go to the ITS channel. From there click the "Microsoft Office 2016 Installation" tutorial and follow the directions. Each person gets 5 free downloads to any PC and 5 free downloads to any mobile device!

HOW TO APPLY FOR FINANCIAL AID

Go to www.studentaid.gov Fill out the FAFSA.

- You must do this every year before summer!
- The college code for ASUB-HS is 001091.
- It takes a few weeks after the semester starts to get your financial aid processed.

DROPPING A CLASS

Step 1: Check with Sarah in Financial Aid to make sure dropping a class won't affect your aid!

Step 2: Talk with your teacher and see if there's anything you can do to improve your grade this semester.

Step 3: If there's nothing you can do to bring your grade up, fill out a drop form with your teacher.

Step 4: Notify your advisor and make a plan for how to proceed next semester.

You can drop a class anytime in the first week with no penalty. After that, you will need to follow this process. Check the academic calender for the last drop date.

SATISFACTORY ACADEMIC PROGRESS - WHAT IS IT?

To keep your financial aid and remain in TRIO, you'll need to maintain satisfactory academic progress. This means completing at least 67% of the classes you started with a passing grade. Your GPA should be 2.0 or higher.

Everyone gets one "grace semester" in case you have an emergency and have to drop out or fail too many classes. After that, you will lose financial aid. Be sure to get tutoring if you are struggling! Building study skills and getting tutoring will help you maintain academic progress.

HOW DO I GET TUTORING?

Drop in to AC252 and ask one of our tutors for help! It's free for all TRIO students!

You can also ask our tutors about Zoom tutoring.

MONEY MANAGEMENT

WHERE TO PUT YOUR MONEY
Banks and credit unions are the safest
places to keep your money. Banks are
for-profit businesses owned by
investors, while credit unions are nonprofit financial co-ops owned by
members. Their services are similar,
and either one is a good choice.

Your money is insured for up to \$250,000 in either one, so you don't have to worry if your banking institution goes out of business, is bankrupt, or burns down.

Choose a bank that offers free checking and free "in-network" ATMs. Some banks will offer special deals for students. A checking account is the most accessible place to store your money. Look for banks that allow you to track your purchases online and keep an eye out for fees.

Search online to find a checking account that fits your needs. Some will require a service charge, while others may require that you keep a certain amount in the account at all times. Be honest with yourself about what will be best for you.

DEBIT VS. CREDIT CARDS

A debit card allows you to access money directly from your bank account and use it to pay businesses. We recommend this for most purchases. There is no interest and you don't have to pay a bill as long as you only spend what is in your account. Overdrafts can be expensive, so keep track of how much money you have.

Credit cards allow you to spend money whether or not it's in your bank account, but be careful! If you don't pay it off at the end of the month you'll be charged interest.

HOW TO SAVE MONEY

- Small savings add up quickly. Here are some tips that will add up over time: Choosing Walmart over a gas station for snacks can make a big difference over time!
- Meal plans are available from the cafeteria, and can help you save \$1.50 per meal!
- Sharing an apartment with friends can help reduce costs.
- Rent textbooks instead of buying them.
- Ask for "student discounts" everywhere! Get a student ID in the learning center.
- Limit alcohol and tobacco costs for big savings.
- Use coupons and rewards cards.
- Consider used items for big expenses like furniture.
- Use a budget to stay on track.

HOW TO EARN MONEY

You can work while you're in school. Pick up part-time work on weekends, or check jobs.asub.edu for work study positions here on campus that will work around your class schedule.

If you work many hours it may be wise to attend school part-time or lessen your hours. Be honest about the demands on your time, whether it's work, school, or family.

Summer jobs are another option for Heber Springs students, since we get a lot of tourists during the summer. Check marinas and restaurants for jobs.

If you do work, you must file taxes. You'll get a W-2 in January, and you'll need to submit that. For simple taxes, the 1040EZ form is available at the library, or TurboTax is affordable and easy to use. Farms and other complicated taxes may require a professional.
