Dr. Methvin Awarded Pacesetter

During the District 4 National Council for Marketing and Public Relations conference held in Houston, Texas, in October 2022, Dr. Jennifer Methvin, chancellor, was awarded the district's 2022 Pacesetter. The award recognizes individuals at the top management level of community colleges who have demonstrated special leadership and support in college communications and marketing, according to the NCMPR website. District 4 includes community colleges located in Arkansas, Colorado, New Mexico, Oklahoma, Texas and Wyoming.

"Dr. Methvin has a firm understanding of the need for creating a cohesive brand and identity for the college; she has been a staunch supporter of the marketing department's efforts to unify ASU-Beebe's fragmented brand to



create a streamlined look to all the college's marketing materials. She's championed new marketing initiatives and rallied faculty and staff to work collaboratively with the marketing office in these efforts, which include the development of program-specific marketing collateral, the development of a new website and the college's first digital marketing campaigns," Methvin's nomination affirms.

During the conference, Methvin participated in a Q&A session with conference attendees and discussed the importance of top-level support of marketing for community colleges.

"I am humbled to have been named the District 4 Pacesetter and know that the award recognizes the collective good work of the dedicated ASU-Beebe faculty and staff with whom I am privileged to work each day," said Methvin.

Also at the NCMPR conference, ASU-Beebe's marketing and public relations team received five medallion awards, placing gold in the Quick-Turn Video and Novelty categories, silver in the Magazine and Video Shorts categories, and bronze in the Digital Advertisement single or series category.



Behind the Curtain: Theatre Renovation & Performances



Richard (Rick) Chudomelka retired from ASU-Beebe as director of theatre in 1999, after 34 years in the position. He died Oct. 2022 at the

According to his obituary, "Mr. C.," as his students called him, had a long

age of 88.

career in arts and education, starting as a music and speech teacher in numerous Missouri high schools from 1954-1964. In 1965, he was named director of theatre at ASU-Beebe, where he designed and directed 137 plays and musicals during his tenure.

Chudomelka was noted for founding the Arkansas Shakespeare Festival at ASU-Beebe in 1965, attended by approximately 2,000 high school students each year. In 1968, he was named entertainment director for Silver Dollar City theme park in Branson, Mo. He later served as entertainment director for Dogpatch USA theme park from 1969-1976

Chudomelka's work with the American College Theatre Festival earned him the Gold Medallion Award of Excellence from the Kennedy Center in 1977. He was also honored as a Silver Anniversary Symposium fellow in 1993 and was a charter member of the Arkansas Thespians Hall of Fame. In 2006, he received the EdTA President's Award

Chudomelka often said his goal was not to create Broadway in Beebe, but to open doors to a whole new world for young people. His career garnered him many awards and recognitions, and his dedication to the arts and influence on many former students will continue to leave a lasting impact for years to come.

After spring 2022 graduation, the theater renovation project began. Seats were removed and new seating was installed, the multi-media booth was rebuilt in the balcony, lighting was updated and carpeting was replaced throughout.



During the renovation process over the summer, the theater continued to be used for teaching stage craft to 4th - 8th grade students in Vanguard Discovery Camp, as well as the Upward Bound summer program. By June 29, the project was complete, and the Upward Bound students were the first group to use the newly refurbished theater when they performed an excerpt from "Peter and the Starcatcher" for the campus community.



The theatre department presented their first show in the newly renovated theater during the fall semester with the presentation of "Big Fish: The Musical" in November.



In the fall, theatre faculty, staff and students traveled to eight high school fairs to expand the program's reach in the state. The program also hosted the hospitality room for high school teachers and sponsors during the Arkansas Thespians event. Ryan Gibbons, assistant professor of communications and theatre, taught 11 classes during the event. These recruitment activities have resulted in approximately 50 theatre majors committing to ASU-Beebe for fall 2023.

Nursing Program - Growth and Expansion

The ASU-Beebe 2022 spring commencement included the first class of students to earn

The ASU-Beebe 2022 spring commencement included the first class of students to earn their Associate of Applied Science in nursing for registered nursing degree.

Last summer, the practical nurses achieved a 100% passing rate on their state board exams, and in the fall, the first cohort of medication assistants achieved a 100% pass rate on their certification exams.

ASU-Beebe will receive \$1.5 million dollars to expand its nursing program facilities on the Searcy campus. The award was contained in the 2023 omnibus bill, which was grouped together with several other appropriation measures, and approved by the U.S. Congress in late December.

Late last fall, Cindy Smith, director of nursing, traveled with the Phi Theta Kappa honor society to El Salvador for presentations and collaboration efforts. Smith met with students and faculty at the partnering university to collaborate on possible future health service projects.

Reflecting on the overall experience, Smith commented: "The El Salvador trip has been one of special value to me, not only

professionally but also personally. It allowed me to be immersed in another part of the world. From meeting the students to having discussions with the faculty, so many aspects of the trip stand out in my mind. However, the closest to my heart was getting to tour the nursing department and speaking with the nursing faculty. Although we do have a common bond as nurses and educators, there was a definite spark that was ignited within me to ensure others know the value of nursing education in other countries."

2024 Solar Eclipse



Arkansas will experience a solar eclipse on April 8, 2024. The last total eclipse to pass over Arkansas was in 1918 and the next one is expected in 2045.

The path of the eclipse is expected to pass through the central part of the state on a diagonal west to east trajectory resulting in total eclipse for several cities and communities in Arkansas, which will include all ASU-Beebe campus locations in Beebe, Heber Springs, Little Rock AFB and Searcy.

In anticipation of the eclipse, ASU-Beebe formed an eclipse taskforce in 2022 to prepare and provide information to the campuses and surrounding communities.

The ASU-Beebe Global Awareness Committee invited Dr. P. Clay Sherrod, astronomical researcher and consultant at the Arkansas Sky Observatory, to present a lecture "Don't Look Up: Anticipating the 2024 Solar Eclipse" in April 2023. Mitzi Adams, astrophysicist with the Marshall Space Flight Center, will also present a lecture in September 2023. The Lecture-Concert Committee hopes to add more eclipse-related events leading up to next year's big event.

Technology Grants Enhance Workforce Programs



ASU-Beebe has received over \$686,000 to develop a curriculum designed to prepare students for careers as robotics technicians in the areas of industrial technology, CNC and welding technology programs. Students are trained to engineer and operate automated manufacturing, specifically by local companies such as St. Jean Industries, Lomanco and others.



In August 2022, ASU-Beebe was awarded \$1,080,000 in regional workforce grant awards from the Arkansas Division of Higher Education. The computerized machining and industrial technology programs on the Searcy campus received \$1 million, and the computer-aided drafting and

design program on the Beebe campus received \$80,000 toward the development of automation and robotics curriculum within the programs.

The grant was used to purchase several CNC machines, such as a 5-axis machine and a lathe for live tooling, and added mechatronic lines, mechanical drive trainers, and conveyor systems for the industrial technology program. The CADD program portion of the grant was used to purchase two new industrial FDM 3D printers for each of the CADD laboratories, as well as purchase two new large format plotter/copier/scanner machines.

In November 2022, the computerized machining program on the Searcy campus received a \$21,000 grant award from the Gene Haas Foundation. The grant can be used to provide scholarships, textbooks, program supplies such as small tool kits, fees for competitions such as SkillsUSA, and certifications from the National Institute for Metalworking Skills.



ASU-Beebe expanded its John Deere agricultural technology equipment program to include a virtual training program with a new dealership partner, Gooseneck Implement, based out of Minot, North Dakota

The distance education program received a \$500 micro-grant from Entergy Corporation to purchase a teleprompter, tripod, a boom mic kit and lighting to support online training programs.

Jake Selvidge, director of John Deere agriculture technology, said, "For the ag tech instruction, this equipment is particularly instrumental in the continued development and delivery of the virtual program for our partners at Gooseneck Equipment in North Dakota and South Dakota. It allows for program expansion nationwide in the future. We will be able to film lab exercises, showing the students a better step-by-step set up and completion. One major obstacle we have had in the past is lighting and audio when trying to film under the hoods in engine bays. This equipment provides better light in the areas and audio for the topic being discussed. The teleprompter helps us as instructors by not having to continually check notes as we are filming the material."

Pharmacy Technician Program Goes Hybrid

Scan for a virtual tour of the pharmacy technician laboratory. New exciting options were introduced in the fall 2022 semester to students considering a career as a pharmacy technician. The ASU-Beebe pharmacy technician program introduced two options for enrollment and learning technology.

Internet-assisted classes begin each spring semester and end in the summer. With this option, students spend limited time on campus in the simulation lab and complete coursework online through the Canvas Learning Management System. The other option is in-person coursework, which begins each fall semester and finishes the following spring semester.

The ASU-Beebe Pharmacy Technician Program has been recognized for educational excellence by the Community for Accredited Online Schools. The program was ranked first among two-year colleges in the nation.



Pharmacy technology is a career that offers the opportunity to work in health care, without working on the front lines. These options will help those students be successful in completing coursework toward a career as a pharmacy technician.

Great job to officers Sierra Miller and Steven Winchell, who have worked hard to lead the PTK chapter, and to co-advisor Meredith Gordon for her assistance in helping lead the organization," said Supratman.

She began her 37-year career as a basketball coach at ASU-Beebe, retiring in 2002 as chair of the physical education and social sciences departments. Lindsey is credited with creating and expanding the curriculum for both men's and women's physical education programs at ASU-Beebe.

Several corporate and individual donors kicked off the fundraising campaign with donations toward the naming of the basketball court in honor of coach Lindsey.

"Jeannie Lindsey is a very special lady to this institution and one that is near and dear to so many who were fortunate enough to have her as their instructor," said Andrea Cole, development officer/major gifts.

The entire restoration project will cost an estimated \$250,000. The project will include completely replacing the outdated gym floor with a new maple wood sports surface by Gym Masters Basketball Courts of Searcy. Also included in the restoration process will be new paint on the walls and ceiling, new pads, scoreboard and benches.

The work began during spring break in March 2023, and will continue after spring graduation in May. Fall 2023 is the expected time of completion.

The gymnasium was originally added to the Owen Center in 1982, and today, an estimated 10,000 people pass through the gym in a year. Over the years, the gym has been used for community and recreation events, as well as ASU-Beebe events, which include high school college fairs, intramural sports, concerts and graduations. ASU-Beebe plans to grow the partnerships within the community for use of the gym.





Cathy Eoff: Inspiring Leadership With Committment to Education



Long before we heard about mini-grants or even imagined a monarch butterfly garden on campus, Cathy Eoff, owner of Eoff & Associates Realty, Inc., was finding ways to help students succeed in their educational pursuits.

In 2006, Eoff endowed the Eoff Family Scholarship as a tribute to her family for their dedication to education.

Eoff is a member of the ASU-Beebe Board of Visitors and has served the ASU-Beebe Development Council for 25 years. She also serves on the Lecture-Concert Series committee.

The consistent and extraordinary giving from the Eoff family has had a significant impact on ASU-Beebe, from the establishment of a scholarship to a Vanguard golf cart and many other fundraising projects over the years. As a result, many students, faculty and staff have benefited from her generosity.

After ASU-Beebe pivoted to alternative learning methods during Covid-19, Eoff continued to support programs. Eoff applied for and received the America's Farmers Grow Communities donation sponsored by Bayer Fund, designating the ASU-Beebe agriculture department to receive the \$2,500 to assist with the hands-on learning initiatives for agriculture students in updating equipment and resources in the department's soils laboratory.

"Education is the key to excellence in any field of work," Eoff said.

ASU-Beebe and Eoff then teamed up to create the Vanguard mini-grants program. The program was a unique opportunity for faculty and staff to apply for funding beyond normal budget needs and was designed to improve instruction, programmatic offerings and/or student success initiatives.

The program aligned with ASU-Beebe's goal of meeting students' changing needs, especially evident during the challenging times of Covid-19. Eoff donated \$7,500 to support funding requests of at least \$750 each during the 2021-2022 academic year.

Last spring, four initiatives were funded through the program — a leadership library, a collection of leadership student texts housed in the Abington Library; math manipulatives to support students enrolled in face-to-face, Zoom and online Math for Teachers designed to increase participation in class activities; a drone pilot training program toward training and certification as a drone pilot; and the establishment of a monarch butterfly garden on campus.

Phi Theta Kappa honor society implemented the butterfly garden project, and PTK representatives were joined by donors Cathy Eoff and John and Robin Hayes at a formal dedication ceremony in fall 2022.

"This lovely butterfly garden stems from private donations, staff and students 'sweat equity' work and their donations too! In addition to the beauty of the garden it is helping to save monarch butterflies and other species within this mini ecosystem and provides enjoyment for those visiting the garden," Eoff said.
