

Keep the faith: it still moves mountains. I still believe that ASU-Beebe's best days are ahead of us.

After I taught high school English and French for two years, I came to Arkansas State College-Beebe in 1966 with my new bride, who ended up also teaching at ASU-Beebe for 26 plus years. After I taught English and French at ASU-Beebe for 21 years, my wife said I died and went to administration.

I was vice chancellor for Academic Affairs in 1987-1994. My goal was to raise standards, improve curriculum, and keep our long-term reputation as a student-centered university. I was fortunate enough to have the support of faculty, staff, and the university president. I could not have accomplished any of these changes without full support from intelligent people who loved the university. Some of them became the major force, the salesman, for some of these ideas.

At my first faculty meeting I told them I wanted us to have 2,000 students before I retired or died. They thought I was crazy. Our enrollment has been around the 500 plus or minus 100 for 20 years, largely depending on number of military people enrolled. But then they started looking for ways to increase enrollment. A university problem became their problem and we became a team trying to solve that problem, a process we try to continue today. Other things we did that helped transfer students was to increase the general education core for the associate degree from 24 to 43 hours. We also started requiring class attendance and final exams as well as syllabi developed by the department so all teachers would cover basically the same thing. We tried to reduce grade inflation by distributing all teachers' grade calculations so they could compare theirs with their fellow teachers. We limited class size so teachers could provide more individualized attention.

I believe all of these efforts and our transparency about them contributed to our developing the reputation of being a high quality two-year college and in our being the



first two-year college in Arkansas to receive the Aspen award, placing us in the top 10% of U.S. two-year colleges in retention and graduation rates.

It also enabled us to score well on ADHE's success rate scores this year. ADHE defines success for colleges and universities as student is (1)still in college, (2)graduated, or (3) transferred to another college. ASU-Beebe scored second among all state two and four year colleges for the success of our remedial students and first place for our students who did not require remedial courses.

I became the chancellor in 1994 and plan to retire on January 15, 2016. During this time we have added two new campuses: ASU-Heber Springs in 1999 and ASU-Searcy in 2003. We also recommended and supported our ASU-Newport campus (1991-2001) in becoming a stand-alone campus. Our campus at the Little Rock Air Force Base just celebrated its 50th anniversary.

During this time we have built 32 new buildings and significantly renovated 11 others at our campuses. We also provided space for Arkansas State University at Jonesboro to offer several baccalaureate degrees and some masters on the Beebe campus. ASU-Beebe has been recognized as a military friendly school and as the safest campus in the United States for the past five years.

I have worked under several good boards and three great presidents who always supported me: Dr. Eugene Smith, who hired me; Dr. Les Wyatt, who was president of Arkansas State University for 15 years; and Dr. Charles "Chuck" Welch, a longtime friend and supporter of ASU-Beebe and me.

I have enjoyed working at ASU-Beebe so much that even after 49 plus years, it is hard for me to move on, but to paraphrase the Bible: to everything there is a season: A time to teach and a time to play in your garden.

Keep the faith: our work transforms lives for the better!




served as vice president of academics at Butler Community College in Kansas since 2010, will begin January 16, 2016.

Dr. Eugene McKay, chancellor at Arkansas State University-Beebe, will retire in January 2016 after 50 years of service to the institution.

McKay has led the university for more than 20 years as chancellor, and before that he has served in various roles from instructor to administrator.

Born in 1941 to a farming family in Amagon, McKay says he learned an appreciation for hard work at an early age. "We worked daylight to dark. We would milk the cows, eat breakfast, and head to the fields to chop or pick cotton," said McKay. "I learned that once you start something, you don't quit."

McKay attended small rural schools at Amagon, Wiona, and Charlotte. "Three things have helped me throughout my life - the value of hard work, endurance, and setting goals," said McKay. "I have used these in all my life experiences."

McKay's journey in education began during high school at Bradford. He excelled in English, writing, and reading. During that time, McKay had the opportunity to meet with

a recruiter at Lyon College (formerly Arkansas College) in Batesville, who suggested that he sign up for classes. With no money to attend college, McKay said the recruiter helped him get a job on campus to pay for his classes. "I relate to the sacrifice and struggle many students experience in getting a college degree," said McKay. "Education changed my life. I was the only one in my immediate family to attend college. We didn't realize there were other options available."

At Lyon College, McKay received a bachelor's degree in English in 1964. He then taught high school English and French at Alton, Missouri for two years before teaching English and French at Arkansas State University-Beebe (formerly ASU-Beebe Branch) from 1966 until 1987. McKay said it was ironic that French was his minor in college, but was the reason for every job he obtained during those early years of teaching.

McKay, along with his wife, the late Dr. Judy McKay, also served as residence hall parents at ASU-Beebe in the former men's dormitory, Quapaw Hall. One of the conditions of his employment as an instructor was that he had to earn a master's degree. In 1968, McKay earned a master's degree in English from the University of Arkansas. Then, in the early 1970's, he and his wife attended the University of Mississippi, and both completed doctorates in English.

"I don't know why I became a teacher, but I had a desire to help people make their lives better," said McKay.

McKay entered the administrative field in 1987 when he became vice chancellor for Academic Affairs. Then, in 1995, following the unexpected death of Chancellor William (Bill) H. Owen Jr. in 1994, McKay accepted the chancellor position. "I didn't want to be an administrator, and I certainly didn't want to be the chancellor, because I felt teaching was the best way to help people with their education. But I have seen my work and mission as the same." In his administrative roles, McKay has been able to lead the institution's change in standards and curriculum.

Under Dr. McKay's leadership, the university enrollment has grown from 2,800 in 1995, which included campuses at Beebe, Little Rock Air Force Base and Newport, to 6,347 students during the past academic year at current campuses located at Beebe, Heber Springs, Searcy, and the Little Rock AFB Degree Center. "This is the merit of a two-year college versus a four-year. We are focused on teaching, not research. Student success is our mission," said McKay.

McKay mentioned that the community and political support over the years has been a key factor in university growth, which began with 150 students in 1955 to being given

state university status in 1966. He noted that the freeway extension past Cabot in the early 70s provided central access for many seeking a college education. He continues to value the community partnerships he has helped develop over the years.

McKay looks forward to retirement and spending more time with his grown sons Shaun, Kevin, and Robert and their families. "I want to be able to see each of my 11 grandchildren achieve their education," said McKay.

Even though McKay plans to attend fewer meetings during retirement, he will continue his involvement in several community service groups. He also plans to oversee the Dr. Judy McKay scholarship, established by family and friends to honor his wife who died in 2013 of breast cancer. His wife was a retired associate professor of English and former director of the Learning Center at ASU-Beebe. This fall, the first recipient was awarded the scholarship. "We both loved reading and teaching English," said McKay. "Judy would have been happy that the scholarship will help others achieve their education."

An avid gardener, McKay will most likely be found tending flowers at his home in the Stoney Point community. Additionally, McKay and his sister, who was born on his second birthday, are planning a cruise. "I might even read a few 'boring books' that nobody else wants to read," McKay quipped.

One thing is for certain - Over the past 50 years, McKay has impacted countless lives both in and out of the classroom.

The Arkansas State University System and Board of Trustees officially approved the new ASU-Beebe logo brand for implementation.

Along with the logo, the university now has new official school colors of blue and gray with a red accent. The symbolic icon features a mirror image 'B' on a shield with an arch shape on the top. 




